



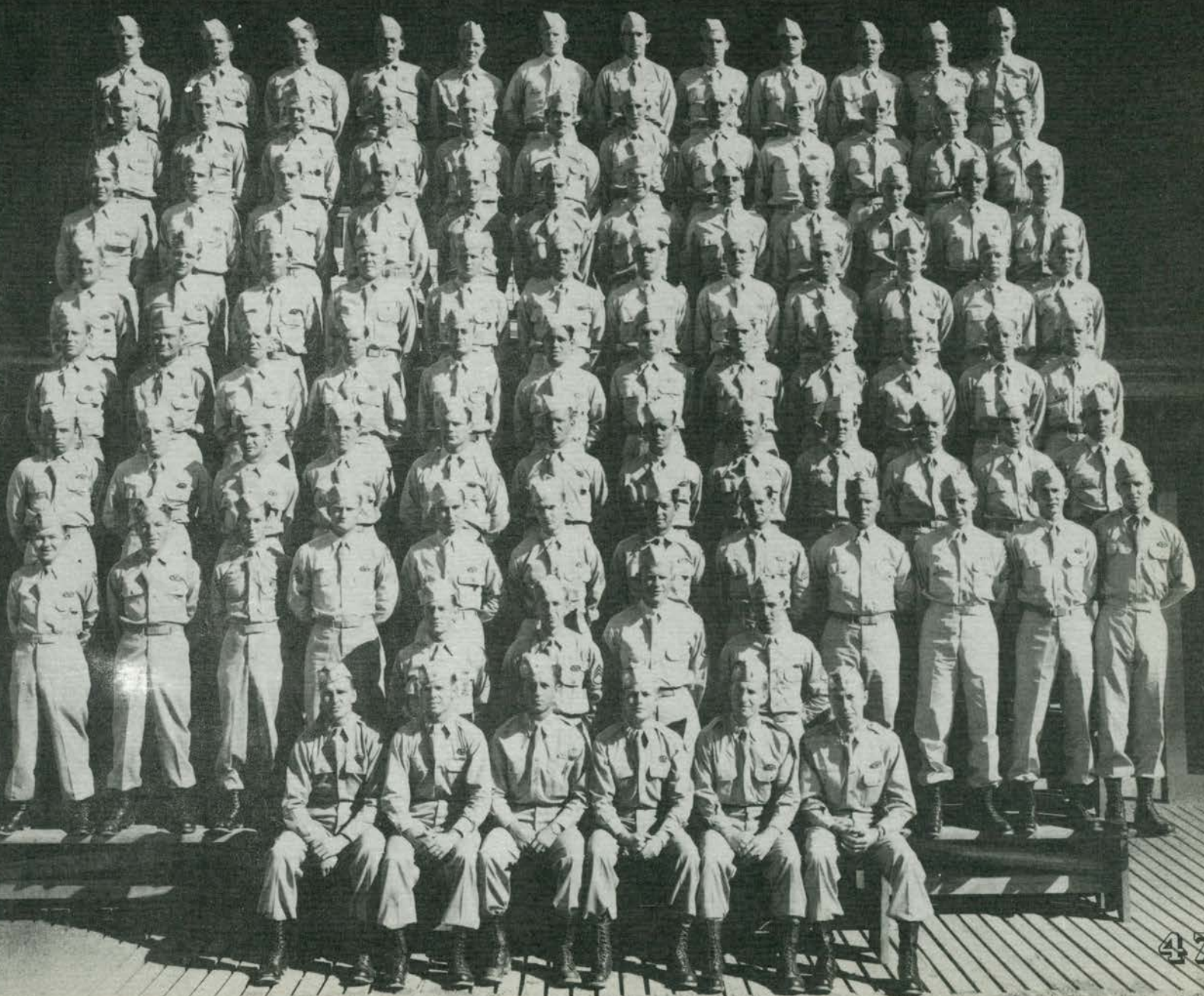

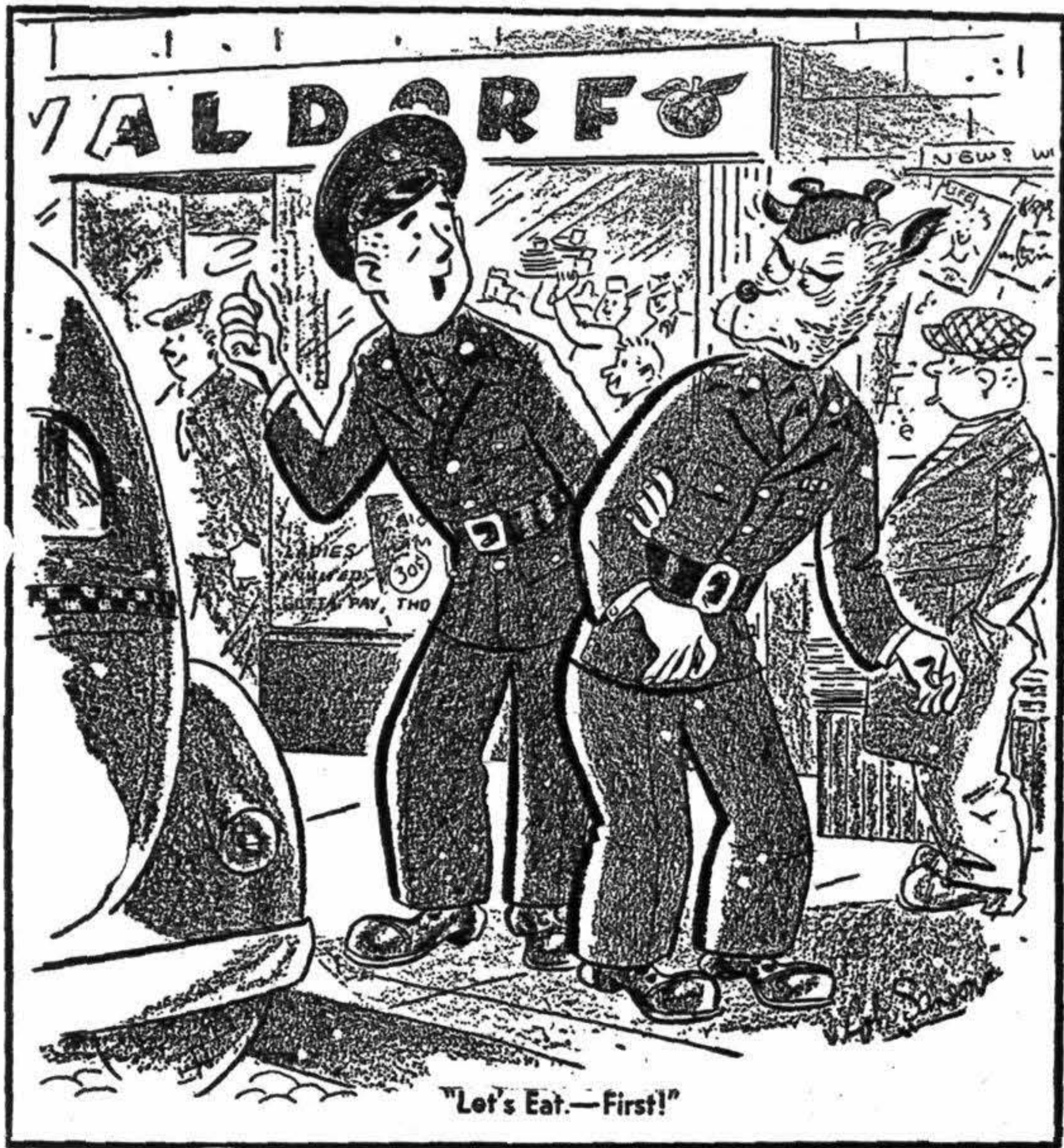

9. D+1 1730, REGT COMPOSED OF 3 CO'S RELIEVED 305 AT LA PIERRE BRIDGE AND HELD POSITIONS UNTIL 1015 D+3. AT THAT TIME CAPT RAE'S CO FORCED THE MERDET AND TOOK LE MOTÉY AND HIGH GROUND NW OF THE LA PIERRE BRIDGE. THE 325th RELIEVED US AND WE WENT INTO DIV RESERVE AT 1300 D+3.

10. D+3 0030, COL MILLETT MOVED HE AND ATTEMPTED TO JOIN COL TIMMES WITH 450 MEN. AT THIS TIME COL MILLETT'S FORCE MET HEAVY OPPOSITION AND WAS SCATTERED RESULTING IN THE CAPTURE OF COL MILLETT AND 200 OFFICERS AND MEN. 13. THE REGT UPON RELIEF BY 80 DIV WENT INTO POSITION OF THE MERDET, REORGANIZED INTO 3 BNS WITH A COMBINED STRENGTH OF 1437 MEN ON D+4.

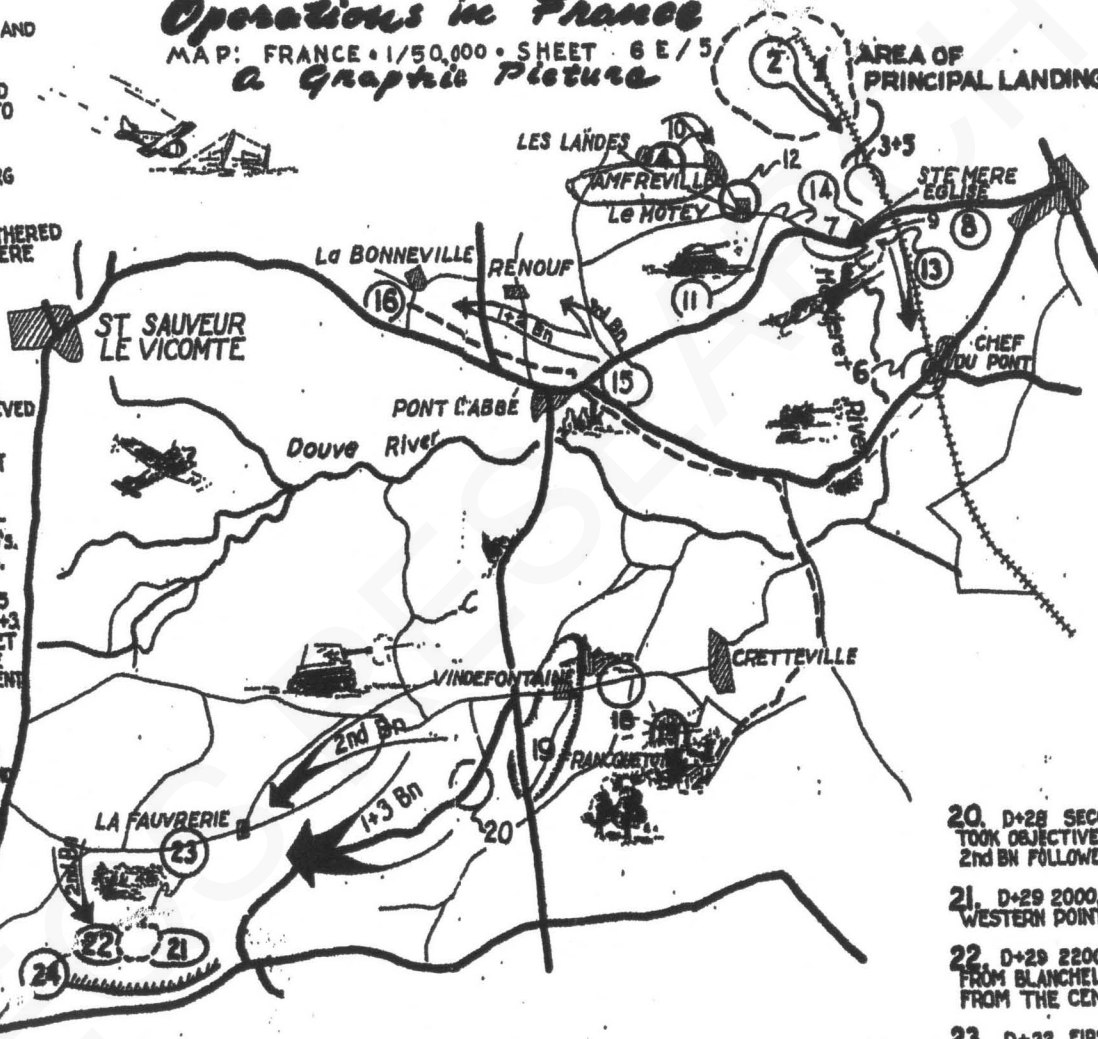
