Holland 30 Sept 1944: Moved out in attack with Co F & G our Bn (2d 101) thru area Co F 2d Bn 325 Gl Inf. Attack was thru heavily wooded area. Stiff resistance all the way. Advance over 500 yds. Bn suffered heavy casualties. Morale fair, rain.
