Progress of the attack during 13 June was disappointingly slow. The 39th Infantry made only small gains while Colonel Tribolet's 22d Infantry was able only to maneuver into position for attack in column of battalions down the ridge to Quinéville. On 14 June the attack was resumed. Tribolet's three battalions fought their way to the nose of the ridge and captured two hills just west of Quinéville. The 3d Battalion of the 39th

Sergeant Turzik Killed in Action

Sergeant Joseph J. Turzik, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Turzik, of 25 William street, this city, was killed in action while serving with the U. S. forces in France on June 14, according to a telegram received from the War department by his wife, the former Amelia E. Syrotchen, also of this city. Turzik was previously reported missing in action.

A native of Poughkeepsie, Sergeant Turzik attended St. Peter's parochial school, and prior to entering the military service three and one-half years ago, was an employ of Frederick Hart and company, inc., upper Main street.

A High Mass of Requiem will be solemnized for Turzik at St. Peter's church tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The officiating clergy will be the Very Rev. Monsignor Valentine F. Snyder, celebrant; with the Rev. Francis X. Harper, assistant pastor of St. Peter's church, deacon; and the Rev. Adrian F. Carroll, Father of Atonement, Graymoor, as sub-deacon. The American Legion color guard will be present at the Mass.

Sergeant Turzik was among one of the first Poughkeepsie selective service contingents to leave the city for military service. He trained at several camps in the south before going overseas in November of last year. His last visit home was made at that time. He served overseas with an Infantry division which was based in England, and took part in the first assault in the invasion of France.

Turzik's widow is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Syrotchen, of 147 Church street. The couple had been married about a year.
