My dear Senator Wheeler:

I received your & Mrs. Wheeler's kind letter of sympathy when my son Walter was reported missing. I have since then received a telegram from the War Dept. that he was killed on June 6, you have so kindly offered your service, and I write you now to ask if it would be possible for you to get more information for me, you see, I have a letter from a friend of my sons who was on the same transport plane, & he states he & Walter were together in the first few days of the invasion & that Walter got a slight leg wound & was taken to their aid station, & later the enemy captured the station, & that he & the company felt sure Walter was a prisoner, what has me so up set is the

fact that Walter was alive for the first
few days of the invasion, & if he was
killed it was later than June 6, & the
War Dept. can't be sure of his death if
they don't have the right date, ~~was~~ would
it be possible to find out how he died,
was it from the leg wound, did they find
his body, did he have a burial service. it
seems I can move rest till I have some
proof of his death. Walter was a paratrooper.
I have two other boys in the Navy.

If you would help me in this, I
will be very grateful to you.
